Memories of mid-20TH Century Woodbury

On Wednesday May 30, 2012 there was an article on the front page of St. Paul Pioneer Press entitled "10 plants shape our state." The article included pictures relating to each of the ten plants. The pictures relating to apples, alfalfa, and corn brought back special memories of my early years growing up in Woodbury.

When I think of apples, I think of homemade apple pies baked for church, community club, and other neighborhood activities like barn dances. You could almost always have a delicious piece of apple pie at any of the above activities. Orris Schilling's orchard along Bailey Road also comes to mind. When I passed by his orchard, I would often see Orris amongst the trees caring for his apples.

Alfalfa brings back memories of Gerald Heinbuch's hay baler (one of the first in Woodbury) that threw the bales into a trailing wagon. One of our foreign exchange students from Sweden, Ake Akesson, said when he first saw it, "what will Americans think of next." Also my Lindeman relatives sang what could be considered their family song "Alfalfa Hay" at family gatherings including funerals. Lindeman family members sang "alfalfa hay" over and over to the tune of O Tannenbaum.

Corn brings back memories of my brother Tom selling sweet corn from his stand by our farm driveway on Bailey Road. His little enterprise provided funds for his college years. Filling silo with my grandfather Walter Raths, neighbors Loren Donath and Wallace Porth, and others also comes to mind. Filling silo was one of my favorite farm activities.

It is hoped the plants grown in Woodbury over the years will bring back special memories for each of you. Come see the wide variety of plants that will be growing this summer around our Woodbury Heritage House.


